Hidden Gems That Can't Be Missed

- ◆ State College Region
 - The lake is a unique area of ecosystems, clear springs and wildlife.
 - Spring and Spruce Creeks, two blue ribbon trout streams, are known for some of the best trout fishing in the state and the region is internationally recognized.
- ◆ Raystown Lake Region
 - Site of Pennsylvania's largest inland lake and one of the largest man-made lakes East of the Mississippi River.
 - Raystown Lake holds the Pennsylvania State record for a striped bass, weighing in at 53 pounds 12 ounces.
- ◆ Laurel Highlands Region
 - Home to some of the region's best large mouth bass fishing.
 - This region is home to the 2,840 acre Youghiogheny River Lake.
